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Community gathers to 'Light up Hiawassee!' with Christmas spirit

Downtown Hiawassee Square was the place to be last weekend as the city held its first "Light Up Hiawassee!" to kick off the Christmas spirit on Saturday, Dec. 2.

The first of many more Christmas festivities to come, Hiawassee Mayor-Elect Liz Ordiales hit the ground rolling shortly after winning the mayoral seat several weeks ago in hopes of bringing a cityorganized event to the square for the holidays.

Along with the dozens upon dozens of lights beautifully decorating the square, Mayor-Elect Ordiales brought another new tradition to coincide with the lighting festivities – a golf cart parade.

This is something new," said Mayor-Elect Ordiales. "We've never done anything like that before and I've never seen anything like that before up here, though it is pretty common in campgrounds. A lot of campgrounds do golf cart parades through the holidays.

"I thought that it might be a great idea, just to go around the square. It doesn't affect traffic. It doesn't affect our businesses. They don't have to close early.

"One of the biggest complaints we get is, on having the parade the Saturday after Thanksgiving, is that it's Shop Small Saturday and they have to close down early. And these businesses don't like having the parade interfere with that.

"So, I thought, well this is a parade where they don't even have to close early."

And what a success it was for the first year. Nine golf carts participated in the parade, each circling the square twice while the judges took their time considering each festive detail to see whose stood out among

A crowd favorite was Towns County Elementary School's golf cart, with its holiday candy lollipops and bright jovial colors. Another that stuck out among the rest was that of TATA On Main, which was decked to the nines in Christmas garb.

But, the winner of them all and the judges' favorite, was Rob and Sarah Pawli's cart with decorations sponsored by Always Christmas.


National Pearl Harbor Remembrance Day is Thursday, Dec. 7, in honor of those men and women who made the ultimate sacrifice on that "date which will live in infamy."

This year's observance marks the 76th anniversary of the Japanese surprise attack

on Pearl Harbor, Hawaii, the sole event that brought the U.S. directly into the grip of World War II.

On Dec. 7, 1941, 353 Japanese fighters, bombers and torpedo planes launched in two waves from six aircraft carriers nestled in the Pacific Ocean.

Their mission: do as much damage as possible on the U.S. Naval Base at Pearl Harbor, Hawaii, in order to keep the U.S. Navy's Pacific Fleet from interfering in

One hundred eighty-
