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Commissioner, fire chief lift burn ban thanks to rain

Towns County residents will be glad to hear that the countywide burn ban has been lifted due to improved fire danger levels from recent bouts of rain.

On Monday, Towns County Sole Commissioner Bill Kendall, with a recommendation from Fire Chief Harold Copeland, lifted the ban on burning.

The ban had been in place since Nov. 4.

Of course, the recent rain doesn't mean that Towns County has escaped drought conditions or the Level 1 drought designation made by Gov. Nathan Deal last month.

As long as the county continues to experience drought, even with some rainfall, there's still a danger of wildfires.

Should the county go through another dry period in the coming weeks, ground vegetation could dry out again with the lack of rainfall, thereby creating potentially more wildfire fuel.

If this were to happen, and fire danger levels once more rise to unsafe levels, the commissioner and fire chief would need to put another burn ban in place at a later date.

In light of the burn ban being lifted, residents will still need to obtain a burning permit if they wish to burn. Burning permits are issued for the burning of natural vegetation only, like brush piles - it is still illegal to burn trash, mail and other household items.

"All outdoor burning must have a permit and is good only for natural vegetative materials," according to the Georgia Forestry Commission website. "It is unlawful to burn manmade materials such as


tires, shingles, plastics, lumber, household garbage, etc.

Residents can obtain a burn permit from the Georgia Forestry Commission by navigating to the GFC online permit system at www.gfc. state.ga.us/online-permits/ index.cfm, or by calling 1-877-OK2-BURN (652-2876).

Should residents decide to burn without a permit and accidentally start a wildfire or structure fire, they could be held liable for the cost of putting the fire out, as well as any damages caused by the fire.

The GFC is expected to begin issuing burning permits this week, which is something it wasn't doing prior to last week's rainfall, though the continued issuance of burning permits depends entirely on daily conditions.

'There is no statewide burn ban," according to a Dec. 1 GFC Facebook post. "Many counties imposed local bans,

and GFC will recognize those as long as they are in place. If your county isn't in a burn ban, we will issue permits when we feel that it is safe to do so.

'We understand that it may be inconvenient not being

able to burn, but hopefully these wildfires have taught us all a lesson about what can happen. The rain has helped our fire danger levels, but we aren't out of the woods just yet! Please understand that safety

of our GFC professionals, Georgia's citizens and their property is our top priority."

Gov. Nathan Deal's Nov. 14 executive order banning the use of fireworks will remain in effect until the drought declaration for Towns County has been lifted

As of press time Monday, a total fire ban was still in place for the Chattahoochee-Oconee National Forests. though residents are urged to check back with the U.S. Forest Service website on a regular basis.

"Southern Area Coordination Center advises there are currently 18 large fires burning in the Southeast for a total of 143,973 acres," according to a recent update on the USFS website. "Wildfires have burned an estimated 54,211 acres on the Chattahoochee-Oconee


