## **Both Union County teams pull away late; take two at Towns County**

Towns County to open Battle of the States with Copper Basin, TN and Polk County, TN on Thursday

Union County scored a pair of victories at Towns County on Monday, Dec. 17 before the Indians and Lady Indians bounced back Thursday with two wins at Hiwassee Dam, NC. (Both reports will be in next week's paper. This edition was printed early due to Christmas Holidays).

Up next for Towns County is the 25th Annual Battle of the States Christmas Tournament, which gets underway Thursday morning. Towns County will conclude the day one action with the Lady Indians taking on tournament newcomer Copper Basin, TN at 7 p.m. Meanwhile, the Indians will square off with tourney regular Polk County, TN at 8:30 p.m.

Towns County will face the winners/losers of the Lumpkin County vs Hayesville, NC match-up on day two.

The other side of the bracket features Union County, Murphy, NC, Walhalla, SČ, Hokes Bluff, AL (girls) and Armuchee (boys).

Lady Indians 38, Union County 51 -- Lady Panther freshman Ava Hunter led the way with 19 points and 11 rebounds as Union County took control with an 11-0 run to close the first half.

The Lady Panthers jumped out front 7-2 and never trailed, leading 11-6 and 31-20 at the first half breaks. Union County would continue to pull away at 43-27 after three -- opening up its largest lead of the night at 48-27 with 5:25
