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Indians get wins over Commerce, Prince Avenue; fall to late run at Lakeview

The Towns County High School Indians Varsity Basketball Team faced three Region 8-A opponents last week and came away with impressive victories over Commerce at home on Tuesday and at Prince Avenue Christian School near Athens on Saturday but fell to a late scoring surge by Lakeview Academy in Gainseivlle on

The week's work leaves the Indians with an overall 7-9 record against a very challenging schedule, including 3-2 in

Against Commerce, the Indians pretty much held the upper hand over the Tigers from start to finish but were forced on occasion to respond to mini runs by the Tigers as they led 14-7, 33-18, and 53-40 at the quarter breaks in taking a 76-53

They built a 12-3 lead by the 3:28 mark of the first quarter on four points each by juniors Adam Barrett, Will De Vries, and Major Moss but the Tigers pulled to within 12-7 on two field goals by the 1:21 mark.

A 14-2 run highlighted by six points by DeVries and four by sophomore Evan Berrong between the thirty seconds mark of the first quarter and 2:36 of the second gave the Indians a 26-9 advantage but the persistent Tigers pulled to within ten points on three occasions by the 2:41 mark of the third quarter with senior Jake Pyrlik ending each of those challenges with

The Tigers then got within single digits by a 49-40 score at the 1:06 mark of the third quarter but a putback basket by freshman Will Travis and two free throws by Major Moss the final fifty one seconds had the Indians ahead 53-40, setting the stage for seven different Indians entering the scoring column as they broke away for the 76-53 victory against the Tigers who were still seeking their first win of the season by week's end.

Lady Indians rebound for victory at Prince Ave following losses to top teams in 8-A

The Towns County High School Lady Indians Varsity Basketball Team came alive in a big way last Saturday night in Bogart, near Athens, as they took the measure, in perhaps their best performance of the season, of the Prince Avenue Christian School Lady Wolverines by a 52-41 score for their third victory of the season.

The Lady Indians had been victimized in losses at home on Tuesday and in Gainesville on Friday by Commerce, last year's Region 8-A Tournament Champion, and Lakeview Academy, the regular season Region 8A Champion from last year, with both teams returning much of their fire power from last year and currently being undefeated this year in region play.

Bogart - The Lady Indians' game at Prince Avenue was a real battle all the way to the start of the fourth quarter with just four ties but thirteen lead changes involved, including four in each or the first three

Further, there were no more than a three points lead for the Lady Indians and a brief six points lead at the start of the third quarter for the Lady Wolverines until the Lady Indians broke away in the fourth quarter for the 52-41 victory.

Despite the numerous lead changes, the Lady Wolverines held leads at each of the first three quarter breaks of 10-9, 23-19, and 35-34 with Lady Indian highlights in those quarters being five points in the first by Savannah Dyer, seven in the second by Madison Mc-Clure, and eight in the third by Jocelyn Byers.

Byers actually included three treys among eleven of thirteen points scored by her team between the fifty one seconds mark of the second



rallied from a 21-16 deficit for a 29-29 tie.

The Lady Indians used the Byers individual run as a springboard for the late game heroics which would propel them to victory.

A coast to coast run by McClure got them a 31-29 lead at 2:52 of the third quarter and a trey by Madison Landress a 34-33 lead at the 1:14 mark before the Lady Indians dominated the fourth quarter. A long deuce by Lan-

McClure totaled nine points and Landress four in the decisive fourth quarter run.



Senior Jocelyn Byers included three treys among a team leading seven points for the Lady Indians in first half play with Dyer close behind with six points on three

The Lady Tigers again had the upper hand in the third quarter, holding a 50-21 advantage entering the fourth when they closed out a 63-35

Byers included two treys among ten last half points and junior Madison Landress sank a pair of deuces for four points for the Lady Indians the last two quarters.

Byers led the Lady Indians in scoring for the game with 17 points and was followed by Dyer with 8 and Landress with 4 while junior Kristen Henson led in assists with 2, accord-

ing to your reporter's tally. Sophomore twins Mya and Asia Jones led the Lady Tigers in scoring with 13 and 12 points repectively. The Lady Tigers completed the week with a 9-4 record, including 3-4 against higher classification schools as they, like the Lady Indians and Indians, are isolated from other

But the Lady Lions broke away for a 20-7 lead after one quarter and led 38-17 at intermission and 68-25 after three quar-
