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
Blaine Rogers took home gold in the 120-pound B-Division at last weekend's 10th Annual King of the Mountain.






After the youngsters were through battling it out, the middle schools took the mat and it was all Union County.

However Towns would get the last laugh as the high school dominated the Panthers by a final score of 65-6.


The Indians will travel north on Tuesday, Jan. 21st to take on Robbinsville, NC.
