Pride coming to Music Hall April 12

Charley Pride is coming to Anderson Music Hall in Hiawassee on April 12.

Pride's music career has spanned almost 50 years, and turned out hits that include All I Have To Offer You (Is Me), The Snakes Crawl at Night, Before I Met You, All His Children, which was nominated for an Academy Award, Just Between You and Me, and I'm Just Me.

He has recorded 36 No. 1 hits on the Billboard Charts; he ranks No. 18 in the 40 Greatest Men in Country Music. Pride also is a two-time Country Music Vocalist of the Year, and Entertainer of the Year.

ton farm in Sledge, Miss. His father was a sharecropper on the farm at the time. When he was 14 years old, Pride bought a guitar from Sears & Roebuck. He learned how to play by listening to Country Music on

Two years later, he turned his attention to baseball. He joined the Negro American League, playing with the Memphis Red Sox. After playing ball for two years, Pride joined the U.S. Army, where he served for two years. Upon his discharge he intended to return to baseball, but injuries to his throwing arm derailed that effort. Discouraged that he would never make it to the Major Leagues, Pride began working construction in Helena, Montana, while he still played in the minors.

Eventually, he earned a tryout with the California Angels in 1961, but they sent him packing; the following year, the New York Mets rejected him as well.

Following his rejection in baseball, Pride turned his at-

Two charged in separate property crimes


Two North Carolina residents have been charged in separate incidents related to credit cards, Towns County Sheriff's reports show.

Mary Kathleen Maddox, 45, of Hayesville, NC, was charged with theft by deception and theft by conversion for suspected activities from 2011 to 2013, sheriff's reports show.

The victim employed the alleged suspect and noticed the company credit card statement had excessive charges. The victim notified Towns County Sheriff's Office in June 2013, and Sheriff's Detective Lt. Mark Cecci began an investigation, sheriff's reports show. The suspect is alleged to

have wrongly charged services and items to the victim's credit card, as well as allegedly taking money from her employer, sheriff's reports show.

The total amount of the alleged theft is in excess of \$19,000. Maddox was arrested and booked into the Towns County Detention Center and in Hayesville, NC reported the

Hayesville, NC man has been arrested by Towns County Sheriff's Office in connection with fraudulent use of a credit card. From May through August 2013, the suspect allegedly participated in over 200 fraudulent transactions at various locations in Towns County, as well as locations in

North Carolina. Apec Atlantic Inc., based
