NEW HIAWASSEE UTILITY BILLING SYSTEM

Mayor Barbra Mathis has announced that a new Utility Billing System is being implémented this month for city utilities. "We expect a delay in the mailing of our Water and Sewer Bills due to this change" stated, Mayor Mathis. "Customers' should receive their bill by the end of this week and we ask that they be aware that the billing cycle for February usage will have several extra days. There will not be any late fees applied this month due to this delay in mailing bills."

"The City apologizes for this delay in mailing. The new Billing System will be more efficient over the long run, will result in lower mailing costs, and will better generate state and federal reports," stated City Manager Rick Stancil. "There will be a change in the billing format with greater usage information and the format should be more user friendly." The new Billing System will also have greater payment options including bank drafts and online payments over the new City web page. To sign up for Bank Drafts, customers will need to provide a "voided" check to the Utility Billing Department. The City is encouraging water and sewer customers to review their new bill carefully for errors in information due to the conversion of data from the old Utility Billing System. We also ask our customers to be patient during this conversion. We recognize that errors will be made and apologize in advance for any problems this may cause. The Hiawassee City Council is asking the local legislative delegation to call for a referendum regarding liquor sales in the city.

The action happened on Tuesday, March 5th, as the Hiawassee City Council signed a resolution calling for a "local legislative delegation" made up of House District 8 State Rep. Stephen Allison (R-Blairsville), and Senate District 50 State Senator John Wilkinson, (R-Toccoa) to introduce local legislation in the Georgia General Assembly calling for a city referendum on the issue of liquor sales within the city limits of Hiawassee.

'The way this works in the Senate is that we have an understanding in local legislation," Sen. Wilkinson said. 'The representative signs and introduces legislation in the House and if if passes, it come to the senate. I will then sign it and introduce it to the Senate. To be honest

with you, I haven't seen it yet. 'I am a firm believer in transparency in government and the voters have a right to know what is going on with their elected officials," Sen. Wilkinson said. "I support their right to vote on

Towns County Tax Commissioner Bruce Rogers reports that things are running 'pretty smoothly" with no glaring issues regarding Georgia's new Title Ad Valorem Tax (TAVT) that went into effect on Friday, March 1st.

Rogers wants folks to know that he is just the messenger and this is a statemandated title tax and local governments had no say as to

whether they wanted it. HB 80/266 underwent some revisions since March 1st and the amended version of this bill was approved by the House and the Senate and signed into law by Governor Nathan Deal on Wednesday, March 6th.

Some of those changes include removing the language "purchased in this state" and now allows all vehicles purchased between January 1, 2012 but prior to March

1, 2013 to opt-in to the new TAVT regardless of where the car was purchased.

The opt-in period has been adjusted as well and the extended period for opting in to the new title tax has been extended to Feb. 28, 2014.

Rogers wants to emphasize that folks will still have to renew their tags on or before their birthday each year. This has been an

area of confusion for some See Title, page 10
