Clay County, NC, including six members and Tender 1 tanker.

Towns County American Red Cross personnel arrived on scene with coffee, hot chocolate, and water to the appreciation of the exhausted firefighters. The family spent the night in a room at The Holiday Inn, compliments of American Red Cross.

The home was a total loss, and Copeland remained on scene until the next morning watching for flare-ups.

He was relieved by rested crew members who wet down the remaining hot spots until 4 p.m. Thursday evening.

"As the Information Officer for Towns County Fire & Rescue, I would advise anyone who finds themselves in a burning building, to get out of the building and stay out," Capt. Sellers said. "To return inside a burning building to retrieve a lost pet, valuables, or keepsakes is very dangerous.

"Inhaling the smallest amount of smoke can cause choking, disorientation, and dizziness," Capt. Sellers said.



"And then it becomes the firefighters' duty to put their lives in jeopardy to rescue the victim inside.

In other Fire & Rescue News, on Thursday afternoon, Station 2 fought a small woods

fire off Plottown Road and on Friday morning a truck fire on Byers Creek Rd.

"Our sympathies go out to the family that lost their home and family pet," Capt. Sellers said.

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pute with weapons involved on Sept. 15, 2011.

Enotah Circuit District Attorney Jeff Langley remembers Whittle well.

"Deputy Whittle was responding to a domestic disturbance involving weapons when his patrol car left the roadway and struck a tree near the intersection of Mt. Pleasant Church Road and Bowers Circle," he said. "Deputy Whittle was responding to a threat in his community."

Deputy Whittle was transported to Union General Hospital that afternoon before being flown to Erlanger Hospital.

Deputy Whittle had served with the Union County Sheriff's Office for less than one year.

He died Sept. 18, 2011 from injuries sustained in the crash.

In May 2012, the Union County Sheriff's Office retired Badge 221, the one worn by the 38-year-old deputy.

Deputy Whittle's service revolver also was retired and presented it to the Whittle family along with the fallen deputy's uniform.

works to reduce your chance of having a wildfire in your backyard," Riley said. "Firewise USA is a community approach to wildfire mitigation. Get involved with activities around the county or put some Firewise USA programs into practice at your home."

Those practices include clearing leaves and other debris from gutters, eaves, porches and decks;

Remove dead vegetation from under your deck and within 10 feet of the house;

Remove anything stored underneath decks or porches; Screen or box-in areas below patios and decks with wire mesh;

Remove flammable materials (firewood stacks, propane tanks, dry vegetation) within 30 feet of your home's foundation and outbuildings;

Keep your lawn hydrated and maintained. If it is brown, cut it down to reduce fire intensity. Dry grass and shrubs are fuel for wildfire;

Cover exterior attic vents

with metal wire mesh; Join your neighbors on March 22 to help make your community and Towns County safe from wildfire.

"This is my first time and I think it was a success for my first year," Harrison said. "We plan on doing a better job of getting the word out and hope to double the turnout with about 40 boats in 2015 and continue to grow this thing to support our football program."

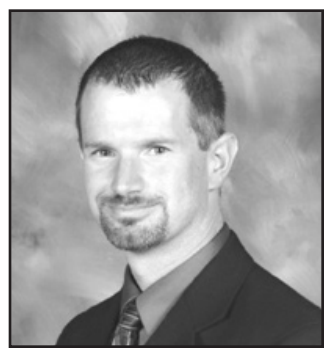
Two Basic Personal Safety/Firearms classes are full. Two class nights plus range day. Start dates in April and May. Updates will be sent.

Tea Party debate night

The Union Towns County Tea Party will host Dr. Dan Eichenbaum of Freedom Forum and guest, and Jacqueline Peterson & David Gulden-schuh of Convention of States for a debate/discussion of the options and pros and cons of Article V (5) of the American Constitution. This event will be held at the Brasstown Community Civic Center at 255 Settawig Road, Brasstown, NC at 7 p.m.

If you're not familiar with the workings of Article V of our Constitution or the Tenth Amendment and you want to know how they work and how each might affect you, please consider attending this event. Article V of the United States Constitution addresses the process for amending the Constitution of the Republic for the United States of America. The debate/discussion will address the issue of individual state's nullification of unconstitutional federal laws and policies versus an Article V Convention of States to amend the American Constitution.

On February 5, 2014, the Georgia Senate passed the Convention of States application. The Georgia House passed the application on March 7, 2014. If the Legislatures of 33 more states follow

suit, then an Article V Convention of States will become a reality. On March 5, HB707, which bans Georgia from participation in the Affordable Care Act (effectively nullifying it in GA), passed in the Georgia House, and is pending a vote in the Georgia Senate. This happened under Tenth Amendment authority. Which of these sorts of actions is most likely to "fix" America? Is there a 'quick fix' for America? Only an informed electorate can say. Please join us for this event.

Incidentally, the "Republic for the United States of America" is sovereign and worlds apart in definition from the "United States of America". Under the former, you're a sovereign citizen; under the latter, you're a subject.

As always, we pray for God to recognize and reward our Christian efforts, we salute the flag of the Republic for the United States of America and we recognize American Veterans, peace officers and others who have sworn, fought for, and died to defend our original American Constitution, and the liberty, individuality and freedom it guarantees, against all enemies both foreign and domestic.
