The win comes on the heels of victories over Rabun County and Lakeview Academy and avenges a 2-1 loss to the Lady Panthers last month.


"Towns County is a very good team and they jumped on us early and we couldn't recover," Union County Head Coach Tim Hunter said.




County squads are on the rise and are not to be taken lightly.

Patton named All-State

Towns County Lady Indian Sophomore Stephanie Patton has been selected as an honorable mention member of the Class A All State Girls Basketball Team by the *Atlanta* Journal and Constitution.

She received this statewide honor after having been selected by the coaches as both a freshman and sophomore as a member of the All Region 8-A First Team.

Patton was at or near the top statistically on her Lady Indians team in such categories as points scored and average, 3-point field goals, free throw percentage, assists, and steals and she was a reliable rebounder as well from her guard position.

She became the first sophomore in TCHS history to reach 600 points in a single season with only one prior Lady Indian and one Indian known to have reached this total in made the first team and her one year.
