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Lady Indians: Area Champs four years running

Indians headed to State Sectionals on May 4 after placing second at Area

Towns County's Lady Indians are Class A Area Champs, marking the fourth year in a row these golfers have won the honor.

Area competition took place on Monday, April 20, at the Double Oaks Golf Course in Commerce, and Sophomore Kenzie Jenkins, with her score of 85, was low medalist for the second year

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The Towns County Indians baseball team rounded out its season last week with a 5-1 win against the Lakeview Lions, before hosting Senior Night at home.


