It was a great time with some really good food prepared by the professional chefs at BVR as the faculty and coaches of TCHS honored their award-winning athletes.



Lady Indians' soccer ends at Fellowship

Roswell - The Towns County Lady Indians soccer team finished its 2013 season with a loss to Fellowship Christian 8-1 in the first round of the State playoffs.

The Lady Indians entered the playoffs ranked third in their division and drew Fellowship Christian who finished second in their division. The Fellowship Paladins were hitting on all eight cylinders as the game got underway and basically dominated the tribe for the win.

The Paladins drew blood early from 3-yards out at the 36:13 mark to take the lead 1-0 and never looked back. Sophomore keeper Taylor McCarter had her hands full as the Paladins handled the ball with intensity and determination and scored again at the 30:03 mark from 5-yards out to lead 2-0. Fellowship again put the ball in range at the 27:54 mark and scored from 5-yards to lead 3-0. Another goal at the 22:11 mark from 10-yards which sailed over McCarter's head and then again at the 17:55 mark from 10-yards to lead at the half 5-0.

The Indians hustled well and put forth a solid effort but just couldn't get it done in the second period against a determined Fellowship team on their home field. Junior Taylor Vardeman and junior Makayla Underwood were solid in the midfield on defense but the Paladins were handling the ball well and recovered every

Junior Kaila Reece had some good fast breaks off the left side but the Paladins defense was solid and forced several shots at goal to go off line. Junior Faithe Robinson had several shots at goal with only one finding its mark as she scored off of an assist by junior Destiny Blythe.

Senior Dadrion Blythe played a solid keeper position in the second half and had many good stops at goal from the Paladins. She was caught in
