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# Workforce Development almost 1 year old

A year ago, Micah Thomas began a journey that no one could predict.

As the mobile jobs bus driver and its only training instructor, Thomas is the link between gainful employment and building an accurate resume for many job seekers in Northeast Georgia.

The journey began when Georgia Mountains Regional Commission Workforce Development obtained two mo-

bile training units with Workforce Investment Act funding through the Governor's Office of Workforce Development. Thomas became Work

#### **Towns deputies arrest Cornelia UCB** bank robbery suspect

Towns County sheriff's deputies have arrested a 57year-old Banks County man wanted for armed bank robbery at a United Community Bank in Cornelia on April 26.

Raymond Whitmire allegedly waited in line and when he approached the teller he allegedly threatened that he had a hand grenade. Subsequent search war-

rants executed at Whitmire's residence in Banks County revealed what authorities suspect were possible bomb-making materials.

Cornelia authorities felt the bank robbery suspect should be considered armed and dangerous. Towns County authori-

ties were made aware on Saturday May 10 that the suspect in that robbery could be in Towns County at a motel or a residence off Georgia 339 in Young Harris.

Acting on this information, an investigation began and a check was made of local motels and the residence in

At approximately midnight on Sunday, May 11, Deputy Jeremy Parker and SSgt. Cory Ingram located an SUV at the particular residence, which fit the description of the vehicle allegedly used at the scene of the bank robbery. Deputies on the scene continued the

investigation. Deputies Parker and Ingram discovered that the vehicle was attempting to leave the residence at approximately

After leaving the residence, the suspect was about to pull onto Hwy. 339, a felony stop was conducted by SSgt. Ingram, Deputies Parker and Schuknect, and Chief Deputy Jeff Edge. The suspect was taken into custody and arrested without incident.

Whitmire, of Banks County, was booked into the Towns County Detention Center on May 11 and released into the custody of Habersham County aurthorities on the same date.
