Dr. Bettie Sellers, who taught at Young Harris College for 32 years, has died at the

Dr. Sellers died on Friday in Hayesville, NC, according to Banister Funeral Home of Hiawassee. Sellers was a noted au-

thor, historian and of course, poet. She was a leader in the Byron Herbert Reece Society, and she understood Reece better than anyone. Like Reece before her,

Dr. Sellers was a legend in her own time. She won an Emmy Award for her role in producing the film depicting Reece's The news of Dr. Sellers' death was announced at the

First Southern Literary Trail Trailfest at the Reece Heritage Center and Farm in Choestoe, in Union County. Dr. Sellers will be remembered Saturday at the 10th

Annual Byron Herbert Reece Society Meeting at the Reece Pavilion at the Heritage Center in Union County. "Dr. Bettie Sellers was so engaging a presence that it will take us a long time to

fully absorb the reality of her

passing," said Dr. John Kay,

Dr. Sellers authored several volumes of poetry and was well published in academic literary journals and antholo-

Her many awards include Poet of the Year by the American Pen Women, Governor's Award in the Humanities, Georgia Author of the Year in Poetry, and being named Poet Laureate of Georgia during the tenure of Gov. Zell Miller.

However, Dr. Sellers was best known and loved as a teacher. She inspired students old and young through her work at Young Harris College, her church, Institute for Con-

Gov. Deal library funding; \$900,000 headed to Towns

The Mountain Regional Library System's public library in Towns County will receive \$900,000 to help fund renovations that will double the library's size to approximately 8,000 square feet. The funding is part of the

state's \$19.3 billion budget for FY2014. The budget includes \$4.5 million in bond funds for three new library construction projects and \$3.99 million in bonds to fund repair-and-renovation projects and to replace computer equipment statewide.

Gov. Nathan Deal signed the library legislation into law on May 7th making the coveted library grant for Towns County a reality.

Without the commitment and hard work of Towns County Commissioner Bill Kendall, Senate District 50 State Sen. John Wilkinson, House District 8 State Rep. Stephen Allison, the Towns County Library Board, Branch Manager Debbie Phillips, and the many Towns County citizens who wrote, called, or emailed our elected officials asking them to support the project, this project would not have been funded," said Donna Howell, director of the Mountain Regional Library System.

"This project has been in the planning stages for many years, Commissioner Kendall first signed the application for

the state funds in January 2009. The current library was completed in 1988 and has completely outgrown the available space,"

Howell said. Library Board Chair Jounida Bradley was ecstatic.

'I am most happy for the children of Towns County," Bradley said. "They have been crowded into a small area where there's hardly any room to move, thus hampering their learning experiences. But they will now have a much larger space to call their own.'

Howell said the state bond funding allows MRLS to take advantage of local Special Purpose Local Option Sales Tax funds that were approved in March
