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Homeowners Association hopes to consolidate water

The Towns County Homeowners Association met for its annual meeting at the Towns County Civic Center on Friday, June 24.

Water was the primary topic of this year's meeting. The association wishes to merge the three separate water authorities within Towns County to form one single water authority to cover the entire county.

Towns County Homeowners Association President Noel Turner invited both District 50 State Sen. John Wilkinson and Rabun County Water and Sewer Authority General Manager Brendan Thompson to speak on their experiences with a similar merger in neighboring Rabun County.

"Currently, as you may or may not know, we have serving three authorities 10,000 people in the coun-

tv." Turner said. "The city of Young Harris has their own well, there's the Towns County Water Authority as well as the city of Hiawassee.

"Our opinion is, and it's merely an opinion at this point, but we feel that we need

a consultant to come in to look at what's going on here and look at the deficit and look to see if there are any redundancies (duplication of services).

"We want to see if it makes sense for the people of Towns County, not for the

individual cities within the county, but for the people to have one authority.

A primary concerns that sparked this desire for a joint authority are the multi-colored fire hydrants throughout the county that

have questioning working capacities as well as the overall water usage of the various authorities throughout the county, based on statistics taken by the Georgia Environmental Finance Authority.

General Manager Thompson informed the crowd on the ins and outs of the Rabun County Water Authority merger. Thompson went into great detail about how this merger effected not only the people of Rabun County but also the internal cities and entities within the county.

The legislation to set up the new Rabun County Water and Sewer Authority was signed in 2013 and the authority assumed all the assets from existing authorities in 2014.

"The goal, plain and simple, is to consolidate all water and sewer assets for Rabun County, all under one house," said Thompson. "When you have redundancies with more authorities, you get higher rates, and we wanted to better serve the county."

"But there are a lot of legalities, technicalities and. I hate to say it, egos that are involved in doing something like this," he said. "It's not going to happen fast, it's going to take a while to get everything where it needs to be for the betterment of the county.'

Thompson formally extended his assistance to Turner and the association with moving forward on seeking water authority consolidation.

Sen. Wilkinson and House District 8 State Rep. Stephen Allison both worked with the legislation for Rabun County to achieve one water authority throughout the county

When speaking to members, Sen. Wilkinson offered a word of caution on proceeding with such an endeavor, urging members to evaluate how this will effect everyone involved and make certain this is what See Water, Page 6A

- The office of Towns County Board of Education Post 5, between Nathan Noblet and Kilee Smith.

Those interested in voting early can do so on weekdays between Tuesday, July 5, and Friday, July 22, from 8:30 a.m. until 4:30 p.m. each day. Voters will also have a chance to vote on Saturday, July 16, from 9 a.m. until p.m., which will come in handy for voters who work during the week.




