Woodstock - The Towns County 14&U recreation baseball team placed fifth at the 2015 State Tournament, the end result of a wildly successful undefeated regular season and runner-up position at the 2015 District Tournament.


"This was a great effort," said Head Coach Cliff Bradshaw following the Tuesday, July 7, game. "We're playing big areas, and we're competing. We're doing good things. The Towns County Indians

lost to the Summerville Indians of Chattooga County, a nail-biter of a game that went all the way to the 10th inning – rec baseball consists of seven innings - and ended in a score of 5-4. Previously, Summerville

had defeated Whitfield County in its district tournament, and Towns County faced Whitfield County in its first game of the state tournament.

Whitfield beat the Indians, but the boys in blue weren't finished yet – Towns County won its next game in the competition against Barrow County, propelling them onward to face Summerville for a chance to advance.

The story of the Towns/ Summerville matchup was excellent defense on both sides. In the very first inning of the game,

With a score of 4-2 heading into the fourth inning, Towns County had the momentum moving forward – at least until Summerville was able to score two runs to tie the game up. And then a stalemate oc-

curred that started in the bottom of the fourth, thanks to tremendous defense on both sides, with each team going three up, three down for the next three innings Lane Denton broke up

the monotony in the bottom of the seventh, giving his team the hope it needed to win the game by singling through a hole in first and second base.

But the inning continued the way the previous three had gone, with the next three Towns County at-bats ending in outs.

To start the extra innings, Summerville sent a grounder to first baseman Moss, but the next two batters to the plate hit singles, which got both teams on the edge

After striking out the fourth

instructed by his head coach to Jacob Kinsey, Clyde Ledford, walk the fifth man, who had been hot at the bat. This proved a brilliant move as, with bases loaded, Bradshaw struck out the sixth batter and ended the top of the eighth maintaining the 4-4 tie.

Bradshaw left the game with an astonishing 12 strikeouts, and had seen Summerville bring three pitchers to the mound in his eight innings. Moss caught a foul pop

along the first base line to get the first out of the ninth inning, and Fullerton dutifully struck the next two out to give Towns County another chance to end the game in the bottom of the inning. Ultimately, the Indians

would not send any more batters to the bases, and Summerville scored what turned out to be the winning run in the top of the 10th

The monumental effort of the boys on the field that day should be noted as a singular achievement and one heck of a game of baseball.

With a population slightly more than 10,000, Towns County put up some fierce competition for the much bigger counties, which had more teams to choose from to send players to district and state than Towns County's single All-Star team.

"I want to thank all the parents and Commissioner Bill Kendall for their support, and definitely all the coaches for their help," said Coach Bradshaw. "A lot of people put a lot of effort into this whole season."

TCHS hires new defensive coordinator

Towns County Schools has hired a new defensive coordinator, Lee Bohannon, and he started working with the Indians last week, who have been busy with practice since early June.

Coach Bohannon is from Rock Spring, and spent the last 10 years at Gordon Lee High School.

He met Girls Basketball Head Coach Jim Melton eight years ago during the Battle of the States Tournament, and Coach Bohannon will help Coach Melton with his team "This area is absolutely

gorgeous," said Coach Bohannon. "It's gorgeous right now, but the one year that it snowed when we came over for the tournament, there was snow on the ground, snow on the mountains – you couldn't beat it."

Last year, Coach Michael Huwe served as the Indians' defensive coordinator, but his departure at the end of the 2014-2015 school year left the position vacant.

Coach Bohannon, with his apparent love of the sport, gladly stepped into the role.

"I've coached football for the last 25 years," said Coach Bohannon. "At Gordon Lee, the last four years I've been the defensive coordinator. Five years before that I was the offensive coordinator. My first year up there, I was mainly an assistant coach. Those five years that I was the offensive coordinator, we ran the exact same offense as Coach Barnhart, wing T."

Indians Head Football Coach Billy Barnhart and Coach Bohannon each coached with a mutual acquaintance, though separately, and that's another reason Coach Bohannon was on Coach Barnhart's radar.

For Coach Bohannon, high school football is all about the kids, and he couldn't be happier being in the area.
