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## Indians duke it out with Rabun Gap in scrimmage as Barnhart era begins

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Without a doubt, these are Billy Barnhart's Towns County Indians.

The 27-member squad was flying around, hitting, and finding the holes on offense.

Their play reflected the style of football that Coach Barnhart preaches.

It was a sea of Indian blue at Frank McClure Stadium on this Friday night.

Pre-game excitement buzzed throughout the partisan Indian crowd as the stands began to fill up before the opening kickoff. This was Coach Barnhart's debut as head football coach and fans were looking for results. Most were pleased with what they witnessed on this night.

The air was cool, the night was young, and the Indians looked ready to play some football.

The Indians came close on this night, but, fell short to the Rabun Gap Eagles by a score of 20-13.

"From day one, they've worked their tails off, and had great attitudes," said Coach Barnhart. "And I didn't expect anything less tonight, and they gave me what I expected. They're doing a great job and I'm proud of them."

The Indians, who begin play in Region 8-A competition this season, lost a hard fought game, but one thing was clear - it wasn't from lack of effort. These Indians won't quit and they love their new head coach.

Rabun Gap lit the scoreboard up first with a 70-yard run and failed on the point after attempt. The Indians answered in the second quarter when running back Kobe Denton carried the ball from the 35-yard-line in for a touchdown, and the point after by kicker Shea Underwood was good, giving the Indians a 7-6 lead.

Man to man coverage was on point, as defensive back Colton Shook made sure that Eagles receivers heard his footsteps all night long. The

Indians made the Eagles work for every yard gained, and then some.

The Eagles found the scoreboard again before the game clock was turned on for this scrimmage. However, the Eagles knew they had been in a football game before the final horn sounded.

Coach Barnhart was proud of the effort. That much was evident in his post-game tone.

"We've pushed them hard all summer long, and

they've continued to push and strive each and every day, and just how hard they went at it tonight - it was a long night, and they never quit," said Barnhart.

Indians running back Cruz Shook repeatedly handled the pigskin Friday night, with several progressive carries under his belt. And Denton proved an offensive wonder, scoring his second touchdown of the night shortly before the game ended. The valiant effort made by the Indians may not

have culminated in a win, but the team got out there, played their hardest, and got a good first look at where to improve.

"I thought we played real well defensively," said Barnhart. "But offensively, we've got a lot of work to do up front still, and securing the ball. We can't afford to fumble the ball at all, and we fumbled the ball a few times tonight."

Coach Barnhart knows what to work on, and the Indians will be ready come game time this Friday night, when

they play their arch rival from North Carolina, the Hayesville Yellow Jackets in Clay County, NC at 7:30 for another scrimmage game.

"I didn't sleep much last night (Thursday), and was antsy all day today," said Coach Barnhart. "Just to get this first one under us is - I'm relieved, but it was great to get back under the lights. Nothing better than Friday night lights, and that's why I do what I do. I love this right here."

## Youth football splits in SMC debut

**Ducktown, Tenn.** - Towns County Youth Football League is finally upon us, and the first games opened Saturday at Copper Basin High School, as Towns County kids gave Ducktown, Tenn., something to quack about.

For those of the uninitiated, the league is divided into age-based divisions: Pee Wee, ages 5-6; Termite, ages 7-8; Mite, ages 9-10; and Midget, ages 11-12.

Towns County went 2-2 for the conference against Smokey Mountains, with Pee Wees winning 28-0, Termites going strong at 12-6, and Mites with a near victory at 16-14.

The Midgets struggled a little bit, coming short of a win at 42-0.

"We're just playing all 11-year-olds against all 11, 12," said Youth Football Director Jimmy Smith. "Some of these kids turn 13 we're playing against. It depends on the date. Cutoff is July 31st. That means by Aug. 1st you could turn 13. That's how it happened in the Smokey Mountains."

Several players had time to shine, like Pee Wee quarterback Cruz Kitchens, who went 162 yards for three touchdowns at only six years of age. Putting up numbers like that, it's likely Cruz will be scouted before too long.

Cooper Floyd, also a Pee Wee, was a force to be reckoned with on both sides of the ball. He went 55 yards and got a two point conversion, with eight tackles and a sack to boot. Teammate Aiden Burrell went for 60 yards and a touchdown of his own, and the entire team worked hard to shut down the Smokey Mountain Pee Wees with a 28-0 win.

This year marks Program Director Smith's 18th season with the Youth Football League,

and he loves every minute of it.

"I'm there for the kids, I'm not there for anything but the kids," said Smith. "Just to see the kids win, lose, it doesn't matter. They still love the game of football, so that's why I'm up there."

Saturday saw some ups and downs, highs and lows, but everyone had a good time and tried their best. Towns County should be proud of its youngins, and put Saturday down on its calendars to show some love for the first games of the season on home turf. Congratulations will also be in order for such a promising start to the season.

"This was our first game," said Smith. "We split - we won two and lost two. We've got Hayesville next week, and we've got them at home. Please, everybody, come out and watch us play. We need support from the county to come out and watch our little guys growing up, and for the future of the high school team, I'm hoping, one day."

Expect a high-octane weekend this Saturday, as the Youth Football League takes on Hayesville all day, beginning at 11 am at Towns County High School.

For the most part, it was just them back and forth, because Kennedy kind of dominated, but we had a solid infield as far as steals, throwing people out, and tags."

I want to come in here, make sure we're having fun, but at the same time learning the game and playing ball."

Losing twice on Saturday was not entirely unexpected,

and Coach Rowland feels the worst is behind them and takes the good with the bad. Pitchers Tori Morgan and Emily Ledford threw a game apiece, and second baseman Carly Gilfillian hit a particularly sweet double in the last inning of the game.

"We did very well as a team," said Rowland. "The pitching was looking good. We had a few errors around the field that we want to work on, but it's early. We've got our two toughest opponents out of the way early."

On top of the recent doubleheader, the varsity girls have a Region loss to Prince Avenue by an 8-0 score, as well as losses of 6-2 to Gainesville, 8-0 to East

Jackson, 8-0 to East Hall, and 13-3 to Hart.

But heart is in generous supply, as the Lady Indians gear up to take on Lakeview Academy at home Tuesday, Aug. 19th at 4:45 p.m.
