"Man, what a finish," said Kenseth. "Kasey did a great job of keeping the pressure on there at the end. I had to use up all the race track to stay ahead of him. I really had to fight to win this one."



The wreck ended the day for Martin Truex Jr., who entered the night 12th in collecting a 35th place fin-



"I'm very disappointed and frustrated," said Truex. "I don't know what happened, but we didn't deserve this. Everything just closed up, and I was in the wall, then I got hit a couple more times."

Kevin Harvick confronted Denny Hamlin in the pit area after the accident.
