I assure you the statement is not a provocative ploy to sell more magazines. Let me describe some of what they might have seen that birthed that strident conclusion. Boys without dads living

at home are about twice as likely to end up in prison as boys whose mom and dad are both present. If a girl finishes high school, has a full-time job and does not marry or have children until she is at least 21 she has about a 2% chance of ever living in poverty in America. If any of those three markers is missing, her chances of ending up in poverty climbs to 77%. American taxpayers spent \$112 billion in 2012 to provide assistance to unwed mothers and to fund the trauma to society caused by domestic violence, divorce courts, etc. And how do you even measure the anguish caused by those affected?

So is "national crisis" too strong a term? I don't

both parents do better in school, have fewer addictions, fewer run-ins with the law, and are less apt to engage in pre-marital sex. They tend to choose friends who Strong words. For a secular come from two-parent homes which provides additional reinforcement. They also produce fewer divorces themselves, because healthy relationships between a husband and wife is a learned skill. That is not to suggest that their marriage will be problem-free, but rather that they were able to observe how you keep loving even through the rough spots.

But wait, there's more. Married adults live longer, enjoy better health, and have greater personal happiness. Married adults are more apt to have adequate finances and greater financial stability. When people marry, their mental health tends to improve, perhaps because of the permanence and stability they enjoy. All of these bonuses help create a setting where kids can learn essential life lessons.

Kids who are raised by their birth mom and dad in the same home suffer less domestic violence in their growing-up years and they grow up to have more healthy relationships as adults. My take on it: Marriage: It's worth fighting for.

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Small farm conference at Unicoi State Park, Feb. 26-27

The Chestatee/Chattahoochee RC&D Council's mission is to help conserve our natural resources and improve the environment for all of our citizens here in Northeast Georgia. Most of these projects involve helping farmers, many of whom are small, improve their land, farms, and economic wellbeing. There are many government programs that help farmers with information on how to do things better and provide information on new things that they can try to make their farms produce more crops which will improve their economic outlook. The trick for the farmers is to know where to look for this help. Below is a press release on a conference that will bring many experts in their respective fields to Unicoi State Park where small farmers (or any farmers) can listen and learn from these experts. I will present a session on the things that Chest/Chatt RC&D is doing for the farming community in Northeast Georgia. conference is sponsored by the Broad River and Upper Chattahoochee River Soil & Water Conservation Districts. Soil and Water Conser-

vation Districts (SWCDs) were created in 1937 by the Georgia General Assembly to protect the state's soil and water resources following the Dust Bowl of the 1930s. Districts provide a way for citizens to set local resource priorities for state and federal assistance programs. Today, Georgia has 40 SWCDs encompassing all 159 counties. Throughout the state, 370 volunteer district supervisors meet and work to conserve, improve and protect Georgia's natural resources. Each county is represented by at least two district supervisors, one appointed and one elected. District supervisors are unpaid state officials who work hand-in-hand with the Georgia Soil & Water Conservation Commission and the USDA-Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS).

Georgia Soil and Water Conservation Commission Regional Representatives provide professional support to advance the goals of local soil and water conservation districts. Regional offices are located in Rome, Athens, Milledgeville, Dawson, and Statesboro. Districts hold regular monthly meetings to plan their work and determine local needs for soil and water conservation and resource development. SWCDs work on a local level to promote statewide conservation goals.

Chest/Chatt is a member of 5 Soil & Water Conservation Districts in our 13 county work area... Towns, Fannin, Rabun, and Union counties are covered by the Blue Ridge Soil & Water Conservation District that meets monthly in Blairs-

and Water Conservation District, in partnership with the Upper Chattahoochee River Soil and Water Conservation District and USDA's Natural Resources Conservation Service, will be hosting a small farm conference Feb. 26-27, 2015, at Unicoi State Park in Helen, GA. The goal of the conference is to educate farmers with small-scale operations on ways to improve their operations and make them run more efficiently and profitably. The two-day conference will feature general sessions that will cover major agricultural topics, as well as breakout sessions that will cover unique topics of interest to small farming operations. Registration for the conference is \$225 per person. However, through sponsorship from the Broad River Soil and Water Conservation District, the first 120 people to reserve a spot will receive a fully-paid scholarship for the event. Registration must be received by Feb. 20, 2015.

Gettysburg. Rosie wanted it mentioned that she has gone to church as a Lutheran every Sunday.



Davis enlisted in the US Army as an infantryman at the age of 24 and was still serving under General George Patton, where he had participated in the Battle of the Bulge. Ronnie left to go home to God,

Marge continued her service to our Disabled Veterans by collecting donations, door-to-door up until May, 2014. She was named "Patron of the Year" for two years.
