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Lady Indians sweep past Region foes Tallulah, Commerce, and Providence

The Towns County Lady Indians Varsity Basketball Team came up with a sweep of the three Region 8-A opponents they faced last week in improving their overall record to 8-13 and their region record to 5-4.

They used fourth quarter rallies to take victories at Tallulah Falls on Tuesday and at Providence Christian Academy on Saturday while building a significant early lead and having an answer for each challenge at home by Region 8-A second place Commerce on Friday.

Indians defeat Tallulah Falls and Commerce, fall short at Providence

The Towns County Indians Varsity Basketball Team ran their record for the 2015 portion of their season to 5-2 with victories at Tallulah Falls on Tuesday and at home over Commerce on Friday before falling in a sometimes bruising battle at Providence Christian in Lilburn on Saturday. The Indians completed the

week with an overall 7-14 record. including 5-4 in Region 8-A.

Tallulah Falls - The Indians made their trip to Tallulah Falls on Tuesday a memorable one as they broke away for a 22-14 lead after one quarter and 47-25 at the half before playing on pretty much even terms the last half in taking an 83-62 win over a home standing band of Indians.

The Tallulah Indians saw their overall record fall to 7-13 and 2-9 in the region by week's end after losses at home by a 74-59 score to Hebron Christian and by a 62-48 score at Prince Avenue. Tallulah actually used a

pair of treys to advantage in taking an 8-2 lead by the six minutes mark of the first quarter before the Indians went on a scoring rampage, using a 20-3 run for a 22-11 advantage which became 22-14 by quarter's end after the Tallulah Indians sank their fourth trey of the quarter.

Dallas Manus included two treys among eight points in the quarter with Boone Moss and Major Moss not far behind with seven and six points respectively.

Seven different Indians put points on the scoreboard in the second quarter during a 25-11 rampage with scoring leaders being Darringer Barrett and Manus with five points each and the trio of cousins Zach Davenport, Boone Moss, and Major Moss adding four each.

Boone Moss then added six more points and Major Moss four in the third as the two teams played to a near standoff for a 65-41 score while Will de Vries, Manus, and Jake Pyrlik provided four points each in the fourth quarter as the Indians closed out the 83-62 victory.

Eight different Indians put points on the scoreboard in the second quarter with Dallas Manus leading with five as the Indians outscored the Tigers 20-10 for a 36-21 lead at intermission.

When the Indians opened the third quarter with 6-0 run, ending at exactly the seven minutes mark, for a 42-21 bulge with Moss providing the first four points, a total blowout looked likely but it is sometimes difficult for a team to keep their intensity with a huge lead and maybe it was just time for the Tigers to have a run after sinking eight treys in the first half of their first game and just two in the two halves since against the Indians. Whatever the reason or reasons, the Tigers finished the quarter on an 18-2 run for just a 44-39 deficit entering the fourth Manus struck for a four

It was a real battle after that with a putback by Adam Barrett and a drive for two points by Davenport giving the Indians 52-50 and 54-52 leads by the 3:44 mark with Davenport's basket giving the Indians the lead for good as it turned out but not without lots of drama. A Boone Moss free throw got the Indians a 55-52 lead and two free throws by Manus and Davenport's third drive for a field goal in the fourth quarter more than matched a Tiger field goal for a 59-54 Towns lead with 2:12 left.

The Tigers got a field goal on a drive for the basket and a steal and field goal by the fifty one seconds mark, however, leaving the Indians with just a 59-58 lead but Adam Barrett got a field goal on a goal tending call at twenty five seconds for a 61-58 Indian lead. And Boone Moss sank a crucial free throw at 7.3 seconds after claiming a defensive rebound, making it a two possession game at 62-58. The Tigers' fourth trey of the quarter and sixth of the half at the buzzer only served to make it a one point Indian win by

a 62-61 score. Boone Moss took the scor-

Lilburn - After the late drama of the Indians' one point win over Commerce at home on Friday night, they embarked on a long trip to Lilburn to face the Providence Christian Academy Storm, a team team entering the game with a 14-6 overall record and 7-2 in Region 8-A.

They left Providence with several thoughts of what might have been, in particular as to how three officials could not see some infractions clearly visible from the stands while seeing light touch fouls at other times, in a game the Storm won by a 62-51 score.
