Blairsville - For their last game of the season, the Towns County Middle School football team traveled away to play bitter rivals the Union County Panthers.

Off to a fast start, Union scored early in the first with a touchdown and two-point conversion.

They scored again with 3:59 remaining in the first quarter, bringing the score to 15-0 with a touchdown and field goal. Fifteen seconds later, Union scored again, making it 22-0. Despite heroic offense by the Indians, notably Cole Ledford, who had a 25-yrd carry Towns fumbled the ball at the two-minute mark.
