
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## TCMS King of the Mountain brings seven teams to the mat



## Lumpkin County pulls away in last half for win over Lady Indians

The Towns County Lady Indians Varsity Basketball Team saw visiting Class AAA Lumpkin County of Dahlonega break away from a competitive first half in taking a 47-34 victory in the Towns County Gym last Saturday night.

It was the regular season opener for the Lady Indians but the third regular season game for the Lumpkin Ladies who got their first win following competitive losses to Class AAA Jackson County and Towns County's sub-region 8A North foe Tallulah Falls.

Although turnovers and cold shooting would plague the Lady Indians throughout the game, they took a 4-0 lead less than half a minute into the game on a field goal and assist each by junior Madison Stroud and sophomore Madison McClure.

They then took a pair of later leads of 7-6 on a trey by senior Jocelyn Byers at 5:13



and 12-10 on a field goal by junior Kirsten Ledford at the 2:31 mark. That would turn out to be the last leads of the game for the Lady Indians but they would remain easily within striking distance into the third quarter. Lumpkin finished the first quarter on a 7-0 run for a 17-12

seconds mark. Byers followed with her second trey in half a minute of playing time just six seconds into the third quarter in more than matching a late second quarter deuce by Lumpkin and pulling

the Lady Indians to within 35-29. Unfortunately, the Lady Indians would endure an extended dry spell after that with Lumpkin using a 12-0 run for a 47-29 score at the 7:01 mark of the fourth quarter. No one would have dreamed that Lumpkin would not score again but the Lady Indians' scoreless streak would last until Ledford sank a field goal at 5:01 for a 47-31 score which would become just 47-34 by game's end as the Lady Indians would manage just a field goal and free throw as the only remaining points scored in the game.

Both teams struggled mightily at the foul line throughout the game and combined to sink just one of thirteen attempts the final 5:16 of the game.

Byers took scoring honors for the game with 12 points and was followed by Ledford with 8 and junior Kristen Henson with 4.

McClure led in assists with 4 and was followed by Byers with 3 and Stroud with 2, according to your reporter's unofficial tally.

## Indians fall to Lumpkin County at home in regular season opener

The Towns County Indians Varsity Basketball Team faced a tough challenge in their regular season opening game when they hosted another band of Indians from Class AAA Lumpkin County last Saturday night.


The physical and aggressive Lumpkin team, which returned much of its fire power from last year's state tournament team, jumped out to a quick lead and never looked back in taking an 86-48 win over the Indians in the Towns County Gym.

While it was the first regular season game for the Towns Indians after a scrimmage victory over Nantahala more than a week prior, Lumpkin had the advantage of this being their third regular season game as they improved their record to 3-0 with the victory.

Lumpkin sprang out to a 10-0 lead before three baskets the final 4:01 of the first quarter by Adam Barrett helped keep Towns within 21-8 at quarter's end. Lumpkin extended the lead to 42-19 by intermission, however, with five Indians putting points on the scoreboard, including Barrett adding two more baskets for ten points in the first half.

Major Moss contributed seven points and Zach Davenport four in the third quarter but Lumpkin extended the lead further to 65-33 and finished the game with the 86-48 victory.

The fourth quarter would provide encouragement for the future for the Indians, however, as the younger members of the team played the final 4:40 of the game while facing a group of mostly more experienced substitutes for Lumpkin County.
