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

Mountains," and each float was brimming with Christmas spirit.


One float in particular was hauled by a bright green Servpro truck and included, to go with the color code, a Grinch and "Whos" from Dr. Seuss' Whoville.

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


## Sheriff Clinton: 'crime is down eighth year in a row'

## Hilda Thomason a Hall of Famer

Hilda Thomason became a member of the Atlanta Country Music Hall of Fame during its 34th Annual Awards Celebration on Saturday, Nov. 28.

"It's an honor to be inducted," said Thomason, who has been general manager of the

Georgia Mountain Fairgrounds since 1995, but has served in one capacity or another for nearly 35 years. "I feel that I have worked for it, and it's nice to have this honor."

"But it also is a very nice honor for the Georgia Mountain Fair, because onstage, several of the different musicians that were inducted that night – I knew a lot of them, but some

## Three Dog Night hits Hiawassee Saturday night

Legendary rock group Three Dog Night is headed to Hiawassee, and fans are in for a show like no other.

Playing Anderson Music Hall at the Georgia Mountain Fairgrounds on Saturday, Dec. 12, Three Dog Night will feature new front man vocalist David Morgan, who joined the band following the death of band co-founder and lead vocalist Cory Wells in October.

"I almost feel like we've been around so long, we're kind of like an NFL football team – we're all really good, and we lost one of our great players and teammates," said Danny Hutton, founder of Three Dog Night.

Hutton formed the band more than four decades ago, filling the ranks of Three Dog Night with professional musicians who knew their trades extremely well going in – which is exactly what the group has done with Morgan in 2015.
