It's official - Dr. Darren Berrong is the new superintendent of Towns County Schools.

On Monday, Dec. 1, the Towns County Board of Education voted during its regular Work Session meeting to name Dr. Berrong as Towns County Schools superintendent.

"It feels like a little load off your shoulders, because now it's been officially done and approved - so, it feels good," said Dr. Berrong. "Of course, nervous coming into any new position not knowing exactly what the job entails, but excited to get started and work with the new board, work with the principals and continue what we've been doing here in Towns County.'

Dr. Berrong has already been working with Interim Superintendent Dr. Richard Behrens in preparation for taking over the post on Jan. 1.

Dr. Behrens assumed the interim position earlier in the school year after then Superintendent Melissa Williams accepted a job as superintendent in Rabun County.

"I don't think the transition is going to be as much as someone coming in that doesn't know the system already, so there's a lot of things I'm al-ready familiar with," said Dr. Berrong. "Dr. Behrens is staying on board through, I think, March, but he's not going to be in the office every day, and pretty much he's just going to be there for me any time I have a question or need someone to we have someone filling this

bounce ideas off of."

And Dr. Berrong is already off to a welcoming start in his new position.

"The support has been tremendous," said Dr. Berrong. "I can't express how many emails I've gotten, how many phone calls I've gotten, how many text messages I've gotten, just from people I wouldn't even expect to get contacts from. The outpour from the community has been fantastic. It's been humbling, and I'm honored that these people would come to me and give me a congratulations."

The question of who will be coming in to replace Dr. Berrong as middle school principal was also answered in the Dec. 1 Work Session.

Dr. Berrong ready to tackle challenge Two dead in Sunday shooting in Towns

Two people are dead following a Sunday shooting at a home on Twiggs Road in Young Harris, according to the Towns County Sheriff's Office.

Deputies responded to a call in reference to a shooting. The call came in at 1:28 p.m. on Sunday, Towns County sheriff's reports show.

Upon arrival, deputies located a couple with gunshot wounds inside the home. Janice Katherine Schultz, 73 years old, was found dead at the scene. Deputies also located Frank Duane Schultz, 74 years old, inside the home. He was suffering from a gunshot wound, sheriff's reports show.

Frank Schultz was transported by Towns County EMS from the scene to a life-flight helicopter to seek medical treatment at a trauma facility. He died a short time later, sheriff's reports show.
