and Towns County Historian Jerry Taylor reflected on the life of Montgomery Wilson as he stood before the family, administrators, and other

He spoke eloquently with great reverence, humor, and heartfelt feelings ad he described Mont Wilson to those present.

Taylor shared many of

Mont Wilson's many accomplishments in education. Wilson served as principal and teacher at the Lower Hightower School in 1954 and began teaching at the newly completed Macedonia School in 1955.

He served as principal of Macedonia Elementary School from 1958 through Jan. 1, 1961 when he became principal of Hiawassee Elementary.

During this period he attended Western Carolina University, receiving his Master's Degree in Elementary Education and Administrative Degree

Mont Wilson served as principal of the new Towns County Comprehensive Elementary School from 1977 until his retirement in 1980.

During his years as an administrator in Towns County, he was active in the Georgia Association of Educators serving as president, and briefly became involved in politics, serving in the Georgia House of Representatives in the mid-

"It didn't take him long to come to his senses and return to education," said Taylor jokingly.
"My first encounter

with Mr. Wilson was in 1961 when he became my principal. I remember him as a kind and gentle soul devoted to the well-being of his students and teachers," said Taylor. "I remember him bend-

ing down to talk to students on their level, whereas we all knew the previous principal had an electric paddle. There was never a thought that Mr. Wilson had one," said Taylor.

Taylor shared with the guests that in 1976, Mont Wilson "was instrumental in organizing the Towns-Union **Educators Federal Credit Union** and 'yours truly' would become the loan officer," said Taylor.

"I personally know of its benefits and am still quite an active member and am glad that Mr. Wilson persevered in that endeavor for the common good of local educators and their families," said Taylor.
"I well remember the

night of Oct. 6, 1986 as we were gathered around the table celebrating my late wife's birthday. The phone rang with the news that Mr. Wilson had passed away. We were stunned," said "I am thankful for the life

of Montgomery Wilson and the legacy that he has left behind. Towns County is a better place for him having passed this way," said a sincere Taylor.
