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

## Hiawassee Police Chief Jimmy Wright laid to rest

Hiawassee Police Chief Jimmy Wright would have been in awe of the send off he received last week.

After all, he had the best seat in the house as hundreds packed McConnell Baptist Church to pay their last respects to Chief Wright, who died Dec. 13 of natural causes.

The 50-year-old Wright was a 25-year law enforcement veteran in Towns County and Hiawassee.

The law enforcement presence for the funeral was astounding as agencies from across Northeast Georgia attended services for Chief Wright. Jimmy Paul Wright grew

up in Towns County and dedicated his adult life to law en-
