# 2013 county budget

Towns County Sole Commissioner Bill Kendall will oversee a special called meeting on Dec. 31 at 2 p.m. in the Towns County Courthouse for the purpose of adopting the 2013 Budget.

The public is invited to

Commissioner Kendall will adopt a \$9.38 million county budget for Fiscal 2013 at the meeting.

The largest slices of the pie include \$1.137 million for the Sheriff's Office, slightly more than \$1 million for Towns County Ambulance Service, \$940,300 for the Road Department, and \$921,700 for the Towns County Jail. Other large ticket items

include \$692,260 for county administration, \$448,650 for Health and Human Services, \$440,900 for Public Safety,

\$380,000 for the County Transfer Station, \$370,443 for Parks Development, \$370,000 for the Towns County Fire Department, and \$294,000 for the County Recreation Department.

A breakdown of the 2013 Fiscal Budget is advertised inside today's edition of the *Towns County Herald*.

Commissioner Kendall urges the public to attend the Dec. 31st meeting at 2 p.m. at the Towns County Courthouse where the 2013 Fiscal Budget will be adopted on that day.

The budget includes a 6.32 percent tax decrease.

The Towns County Lady Indians (10-0) will enter the tournament unbeaten for the second time in three years.

However, the Lady Indians ultimate goal will be to exit the tournament unblemished for the first time in history, with both Towns County squads chasing their first Battle of the States Championship.

Standing in the way of the seven-time runner-up Lady Indians will be two-time defending champion Gordon Lee, who defeated Towns in the second round last year and in the Championship Game two seasons ago. A clash between these two Class A State Championship hopefuls would again ave to wait until the final day of this year's tournament.

Two undefeated teams will stand in the way of the Towns County boys' squad. Class AA's Union County (9-0) and Class AAA's Dawson County (10-0) are again participating in this year's edition.

The last two Battle of the States Boys Champions, entered Hiawassee undefeated, and took home the hardware.

Led by MVP Justin Gonyea, Hayesville, NC entered, and left, in 2011 sporting a perfect record. MVP Seth Merritt and Union County took a 10-0 record back to Blairsville in 2010.
