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Indians fall to red hot shooting at Hebron, rebound for close win over Tallulah

There was a unique combination of quite admirable success and a very potent last half scoring run by one of their opponents in a split decision for the Towns County Indians Varsity Basketball Team last week.

They traveled to Dacula on Tuesday where the Hebron Christian Lions were like a runaway train on their Senior Night in breaking open a close game the last half in taking a 73-43 victory but the Indians returned home for their own Senior Night on Friday and took a hard fought 58-55 victory over Tallulah Falls.

The two games completed regular season play for the Indians as they finished with an overall 9-16 record, including 7-6 overall in Region 8-A and 5-3 in Sub-Region 8-A North. They finished fifth


among ten teams overall in the region and in third place behind Hebron Christian and Lakeview Academy in the

Hebron would resume the hot shooting of the last half on Tuesday against the Indians three nights later when they took their second win against Lakeview Academy, this time in Gainesville, by building a 45-30 lead past the mid point of the third quarter and holding on for a 65-60 win.

The wins against the Indians and Lakeview gave Hebron a seven game winning streak, all within the region, following their only subregion loss, a 76-71 decision to the Indians in Hiawassee on January 16.

Hebron took the top seed position in Sub-Region 8A North with a 7-1 record, dropping Lakeview Academy to second with a 6-2 record, just ahead of the Indians.

Lady Indians overwhelmed at Hebron, overwhelm Tallulah | Lady Indians JV wrap-up

A season of startlingly victory than what might have been expected based on prior games continued last week for the Towns County Lady Indians Varsity Basketball Team. They fell to a surprisingly

large deficit in a 60-27 loss on Senior Night at Hebron Christian Academy in Dacula on Tuesday but rebounded to claim a surprisingly easy 66-25 victory themselves over Tallulah Falls on TCHS Senior Night on Friday. The winning team in each

game was not a great surprise since the Lady Indians had taken just a 41-39 win on their home court over Hebron on January 16 and had to extend just a 36-34 lead after three quarters for a 59-48 win at Tallulah Falls on January 20 so competitive games were expected in both games last

But it goes beyond the close Lady Indian wins over Hebron and Tallulah in creating a puzzle as to especially the margins of victory in last week's

For example, Tallulah Falls defeated Hebron by a 52-49 score at Tallulah on January 23, leaving the expectation of close games for the Lady Indians against both teams and the large margin of the Hebron win over the Lady Indians' and the Lady Indians' one sided win over Tallulah even more striking.

And finally, the Lady Indians' win over the the Region 8-A second place team Commerce and their loss by just four points at first place Lakeview Academy had made the closeness of the two earlier wins over Hebron and Tallulah, the fourth and fifth place teams in Sub-Region 8-A North, less likely but real.

At any rate, the Lady Indians completed their regular season with the split decision for the week and finished with a 9-16 overall record, including 6-7 overall in Region 8A and 4-4 in Sub-Region 8A North.

They finished in sixth place among ten teams in the region and in third place in the sub-region behind Lakeview Academy and Commerce and
