
### No. 9 Lady Indians pull away from 8th-ranked Warren County

The 9th-ranked Towns County girls' basketball team hit the court last Saturday, Jan. 6, to battle Region 8-A opponent and 8th-ranked Warren County.

After a well-played contest, the Indians left with a 66-52 victory.

'Coming into the game, I felt like we had a good game plan for Warren County," commented coach Shea Taylor. "A great week of practice led to our team playing well rounded 'team' basketball. We had players stepping up and making plays all night.' After leading much of the first half, Warren County rallied ahead during the third quarter before Kaleigh Beaver and the Lady Indians found another gear, opening up a double-digit lead early in the fourth. Beaver led the Lady Indians with 18 points, eight rebounds and four blocks. Close behind, Brelan Sieveking scored 15 total points, nine assists and three steals, while Emma Lallement contributed 16 points, ten rebounds, two assists and one block. Other players were key to the win as well, such as Laura Mauldin, who scored nine points and ten rebounds, Scotlyn Fain with eight points, four assist, four steals and one block, and Ansleigh Hardin with two assists and two steals. 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## Indians sink Warren County, remain unbeaten in region

After finishing strong with a victory on the final day of the Battle of the States annual tournament, the Towns County boys' basketball team headed back to the court on Saturday, Jan. 6, to defeat last year's Region 8A champion, Warren County, by a score of 71-58

This win ties Towns County with Green County for first place in region play at 5-0.

The beginning of the game was highly contested, with both teams sharing the lead. As they moved into the second quarter, however, Towns County held a fivepoint lead over Warren. During the second quarter, the Indians managed to extend their lead by 11, finishing the half with a score of 38-27.

Warren County decreased that lead to five points after applying some defensive pressure early in the third quarter, but that didn't last long. By the end of the quarter, the Indians held a nine-point lead, which they would build to as much as 17 points throughout the final quarter.

In the end, Towns County was able to hang on to their 13-point lead for a 71-58 victory.

To pull off the astounding win, the entire team had to work hard. Senior Zane Floyd contributed a whopping 17 points, ten rebounds and seven assists, while seniors Tanner Cunningham and Gage Rogers



each scored 15 points.

### Indians close Battle of the States Christmas tourney with win over Coosa

The Towns County boys' basketball team headed to the court with high goals at the Battle of the States annual tournament last weekend; however, they got off to a rough start, and after losing both the Hayesville and Polk County games, were unable to win the competition. On Saturday, Dec. 30, they bounced back with a victory over Coosa High School, but still couldn't take the overall win. Zane Floyd was named to the Battle of the States Jerry Kendall All Tournament Team, however, following his fantastic performance last weekend. On Thursday, Dec. 28, the Indians battled their first opponent of the tournament – Hayesville, North Carolina. They held a five-point lead after the first quarter all the way into the half, but the Hayesville Yellow Jackets played well during the third quarter and stole the lead with three points. The final quarter looked like it could favor either team, with Towns County out-scoring Hayesville briefly. Unfortunately, however, the Yellow Jackets took and maintained a two-point lead with only six seconds left on the clock, leaving the Indians at a loss of 58-60. Zane Floyd led in scoring with 22 points and six rebounds, and Tanner Cunningham followed close behind with 11 points and 11 rebounds. Kade McConnell contributed seven points, Walker Underwood scored six and Connor Chastain impressed the audience by scoring six points and
