small statured kid from Farmersville, Texas came to be feared by the NAZI forces during WWII. Coming home he became a famous actor in Western movies. However he suffered greatly from mental anguish from what he experienced fighting for America and indeed world freedom, called PTSD today. He never got the medical care he deserved. Murphy soaked his life in alcohol, gambling, and exploits with women until he was killed, financially broke, in an aircraft crash in the Virginia mountains, 1971 at the young age of 46. He had earned: Medal of Honor; Distinguished Service Cross; Silver Star with oak leaf cluster; Legion of Merit; Bronze Star with oak leaf cluster and Valor device; Purple Heart

with two oak leaf clusters; U.S. Army Outstanding Civilian Service Medal; U.S. Army Good conduct Medal; Presidential Unit Citation with oak leaf cluster; American Campaign Medal;Euro-African-Middle Eastern Campaign Medal; Silver Star; Four Bronze Service Stars for 9 campaigns; Bronze Arrowhead for assault landing at Sicily and Southern France; I just don't have room here for his entire plethora of over two dozen decorations. I must speak on behalf of his wife!

Audie's wife, Pamela Murphy, served America as he did, a much understated, and unknown heroine! She served a distinctive 35 year career at the Sepulveda Veterans Administration hospital ,treating each and every Veteran as a VIP! She was an outstanding patient liaison, insuring that every soldier, Marine or other Veteran got to see the specialist they needed. Owed to them! Quoting Pam, she said, "Even with the adultery and desertion at the end, he always remained my

With that in mind, she even got reprimanded several times for going above and beyond to represent "her boys" Our Veterans soon called her "our angel"! One year Pam was asked to become the focus of a Veterans Day column addressing all the work she had done. Pam said, "Honor them, not me! They're the ones who desrve it!

In 2002, bureaucrats representing a politically correct government declared Pam's job as "excess" and decided to eliminate her position via "budget cuts". Our Veterans community staged an overwhelming mass protest outside the VA gates. Soon, afterwards, Pam's job, representing Veterans was no longer "excess"! 

Many of us assume that celebrity status automatically earns those credentials, and that is an unfortunate, even dangerous assumption.

As for the Texas books, we could almost wish that the effort is really some kind of satire. There is certainly plenty of irony to be found in the movement. For some time now the narrative has been dominated by complaints that our history and culture are fatally flawed by ideas and events that make our underserved and marginalized feel unsafe or uncomfortable or

Texas is simply saying that there are fatally flawed ideas and facts which cause the majority to feel unsafe or uncomfortable or outraged, and they want to purge that information in the same way that Huckleberry Finn was removed from libraries and reading lists in other parts of the country.

An eye for an eye until everyone is blind, and dumb, and not in the service of justice, but in the pursuit of control. And that, my friends, is what this is all about, and what connects two stories that should be unrelated, but are tied together because both are ultimately about coercing what other people think by eliminating any opportunities to think otherwise.

Soil Testing

Soil testing is a very important part of growing a quality crop, having a good looking garden, having a qual-



ity lawn, or a good pasture. Soil testing gives you an insider look at what is going on in your soil. Even though it's only February now is a good time to think about soil testing and prepping the soil. Let's take a look at what a soil test can do for you and why it's a good idea to have your soil tested.

If you have a garden at your house it's a good idea to have your soil tested every other year. A soil test will show you the pH, phosphorus, potassium, calcium, magnesium, zinc, and manganese levels in your soil. These are essential elements for plant growth. Nitrogen is also a very important nutrient for plant growth. However, nitrogen is very mobile in the soil. Therefore, you could test your soil and by the time that

you receive your soil results back from the lab the amount of nitrogen in the soil could be drastically different. pH is often the most limiting factors when it comes to growing plants in the mountains. A soil test will tell you the pH

and the recommended lime to bring that pH up to an acceptable level for the plants. Any lime that is added to soil will take 3-6 months to fully take effect. That means for spring plantings, now is a good time to take a soil test and begin adding lime. When taking a sample for your lawn, a depth of 4 inches is appropriate. If you're taking a sample for gardens, ornamentals, mixed fruit trees, and wildlife plots sample to a depth of

6-8 inches. You can use a spade or a soil probe. When you take the sample it's best to take multiple samples from around the plot that you are interested in. This way you'll get an average of the area that you're sampling and a better representative sample. Using a trowel or small shovel, take 8-10 samples and mix them together in a bucket. From that bucket take the sample that you'll bring into the Extension office so that we can send it to the UGA labs. Make sure that you get enough soil so that the lab can test properly. About 2 cups of soil is needed. If you're sampling from an area that has mulch or grass on top of it push that material away so that you penetrate down to the soil. Pull out any rock or roots that you get with the

soil sample and throw them away. When you take the sample, spread the wet/damp soil on a newspaper and let the soil air out overnight before bringing it in to the office, so that it dries When deciding how many samples you need to take, look at the area and determine how many different types of conditions you have. Each soil test costs \$10. For example, if you have a low lying spot, a steep slope, and a wooded area,

each one of these would need a unique soil sample done. When you receive the results from the lab they will have recommendations for you based on the types of plants that you have or Bring soil samples into your County Extension Office.
