Indians sweep GSIC ahead of region series vs. No. 8 Washington-Wilkes

No. 7 Towns County takes home-opener 13-3 over Hiwassee Dam, NC

Seventh-ranked Towns County improved to 6-3 on the year and 3-0 in region play by outscoring the opposition 42-11 over four wins in four games last week.

The Indians started the week with a 13-3 win over Hiwassee Dam, North Carolina in the Tuesday, March 7 home opener. The following day, Towns County thumped Georgia School of Innovations and Classics (GSIC) 14-6 during Wednesday's region opener in Hephzibah. The Wednesday meeting was bumped forward from Friday, March 10, due to the threat of rain.

The Indians returned to central Georgia on Saturday to wrap up the three-game sweep of GSIC, notching a pair of victories, 4-0 and 11-2

Indians 4, GSIC 0 - Junior Zane Floyd fired an 81-pitch, three-hit shutout in game one of Saturday's Region 8 twin bill, striking out seven while issuing only one walk. Junior Tanner Cunningham turned in a 2-for-4 day at the plate with a double and 2 RBIs. Caleb Berrong and Kade McConnell also delivered a pair of 2-for-4 outings; Lane Rouse added an RBI and Stone Chauncey scored twice.

After Floyd pitched around his lone walk during the first inning, singles by Chauncey and McConnell set the table for Cunningham's RBI double in the second.

An error off the bat of Chauncey kicked off a two-run fourth, followed by a McConnell base knock. With runners at the corners, Cunningham lined a run-scoring single up the middle. Later, Rouse scored courtesy runner Eli McNabb by lacing a base hit to right field.

Connor Chastain led off the fifth with a single before Morgan Walker replaced him on the bases. Following a Berrong hit, Walker came around via an error off the bat of Chauncey.

Floyd, who was gifted a four-run lead, navigated a twoout base hit in the sixth inning and a leadoff single in the seventh to close things out.

Floyd and Chastain each went 1 for 4; Chauncey scored twice during a 1-for-4 game and Rouse finished 1 for 3.

Rouse's bunt moved the runners up 90 feet, and Floyd sent a two-run single up the middle for a 9-4 lead. Gillis was hit by a pitch, then moved into scoring position on a double-steal that advanced Floyd to third. After Chastain bumped the lead to 10-4 on an error, Berrong scored two via a bases-loaded double. Later, Kirby's two-out, two-run single built a 14-4 margin.

Three Indians' errors in the seventh helped the home late-inning outburst.

Hiwassee Dam committed 10 errors, including a game-tying miscue in the first that allowed Connor Chastain to come around following his one-out double. McConnell's RBI ground out moved Towns County out front Four second-inning errors sparked the Indians' three-run frame, beginning with an error off the bat of Rouse and an RBI single by Floyd. Connor Chastain's sacrifice fly made it 6-2 when an error allowed two runs to score on the out.

After three scoreless innings, Hiwassee Dam pushed across a run off Kirby in the sixth. But Towns County uncorked a seven-spot in the sixth, sending the Eagles back to North Carolina with a mercy-rule-shortened defeat

All 11 Indians that came to the plate in the sixth inning reached base, beginning with a hit batter to Rouse and a single by Floyd. Gillis singled home Rouse, then Connor Chastain reached on an infield hit and scored courtesy of Berrong's two-bagger.

Chauncey walked, McConnell doubled, Čunningham drew a free pass and Kirby singled for an 11-3 score. Rouse worked a bases-loaded walk, and Floyd ended the game with a mishandled grounder to second.

Kirby fanned two during his 22-pitch sixth frame, yielding two hits and one earned run.

Berrong scored twice during a 1-for-4 day; McConnell knocked in two during his 1-for-4 outing. Kirby went 1 for 4 with an RBI; Rouse scored twice and knocked in a run; Chauncey added one run and a stolen base.

Rouse, Gillis and Berrong added one steal apiece.

The Indians resume region play against 8th-ranked Washington-Wilkes, opening a three-game set Tuesday in Hiawassee at 5 p.m.

Towns County travels to Washington on Friday for a 5 p.m. doubleheader.

Indians 11, GSIC 2 (Game 3) - The Indians swept the series, breaking things open courtesy of a six-run seventh in the second game of Saturday's doubleheader.

Braydon Barrett took a two-hit shutout into the seventh before running out of gas with one away. Cale Kirby entered an 11-0 game with the bases loaded, recording the final two outs after giving up two hits and fanning one batter.

Barrett, who struck out five while allowing four hits and a walk over 6 1/3, was charged with both GSIC runs.

Gillis went 2 for 4 with a double, 2 RBIs and two runs. Chauncey scored twice and knocked in one during a 3-for-4 game. Berrong doubled, walked, scored twice and drove in a pair while finishing 2 for 3.

Floyd went 2 for 4 with a double, an RBI and two steals; Kirby turned in a 2-for-4 day, scoring twice and driving in one run. Cunningham finished 1 for 3 with a run and an RBI. Rouse scored once during a 1-for-3 game.

The final score is a bit deceiving as the Indians broke a 3-3 tie with four in the fourth, then pulled away for good in a seven-run seventh.

Floyd, Chastain and Kirby drove in three runs apiece and Gillis scored three times as Towns County finished with 14 hits and overcame four fielding errors.

Gillis singled and stole a base in the first, eventually coming around on Berrong's first ribby of the game -- a two-out single to center. Towns added two more in the second courtesy of run-scoring singles from Kirby and Floyd.

A leadoff single in the bottom half allowed GSIC to get on the board via an RBI groundout. A costly error and a walk during the GSIC third tied the game 3-3 when both runners scored on a

Meanwhile, the Towns County men knocked off Greene County 5-2 on Tuesday, March 7, then suffered a 2-0 loss at No. 8 Aquinas later in the week.

Towns County hits the road on Friday, March 17 to face another pair of ranked squads at Lake Oconee Academy.

The LOA guys will enter as the No. 1 team, while the girls' game will feature a top-10 clash between the fifth-ranked Titans and the No. 8 Lady Indians.

Along with No. 3 Lincoln County, Region 8 features three ranked girls' teams.

No. 8 Lady Indians 9, Greene County 0 - Abby Gardella, Emma Lallement, Sarah Shook and Jayden Taylor scored two goals apiece on the home pitch as Towns County never looked back from a 6-0 halftime lead.

Halie Arrowood finished with one goal and two assists. Gardella added two assists, while Jaedyn Hancock, Lallement and Taylor had one helper apiece.

"We played really well," said head coach Clay Livingston. "We had great ball movement

Friday's showdown at Lake Oconee Academy gets underway at 5:30 p.m. for the Lady Indians.

The Towns County men kick off at 7:30 p.m.
