Congratulations to Towns County High School Indians Baseball for keeping its momentum train rolling with consecutive wins the past few weeks to result in advancement as the No. 4 seed from the region to compete in the Georgia High School Association Class A Public State Playoffs.

The first round of the playoffs will take place Friday, April 29, at 5 p.m. in Chickamauga against Gordon Lee High School for a best-of-three series, with the first two games set for Friday and a third game, if needed, on Saturday.

Last week's action began on Tuesday, April 19, in an away game at Lincoln High School, ending in an Indians victory 13-2 that would ultimately lead them to qualify for the opening round of the playoffs.

"We came out in rare form and really hit the baseball well," Head Coach Shannon Floyd said. "We knew Lincoln had lost a tough game the night before, and they came out a little flat.

'We took advantage of a couple of miscues from them and were able to score six runs by the bottom of the first inning and just kept attacking every inning from there on.

"We had our sophomore, Kade McConnell, as our starting pitcher, and he got the win for the game and only gave up two runs.

"(Senior) Collin Crowder led the game off with a double. (sophomore) Zane Floyd had two doubles, (junior) Seth Gillis had a couple of big hits, (sophomore) Connor Chastain stayed hot the whole time, and it was just a great team effort."
