Softball: Lady Indians wrap up season with first-ever playoff win

Gibson - For only the third time in Towns County High School history, the Lady Indians advanced to State, traveling south of Atlanta to Glascock County where they spent two days fighting to advance in the Class A Super

After a rough start vs. the Glascock County Lady Panthers, resulting in a GCHS victory of 12-0, Towns county was placed in the losing col-

However, the next round against Christian Heritage resulted in a historical 5-2 win for the girls. Unfortunately a loss of 9-0 vs. Schley County the next day halted the Lady Indians' advancement in the playoffs.

The team made their first appearance of the week at 12 p.m. on Monday Oct. 16, where they suffered a 12-0 loss to Glascock County. The loss dropped the Lady Indians into the loser's bracket of the fourteam Super Regional.

Subsequently, they were matched up with Christian Heritage, who had also been placed in a lower column following a lost game vs. Schley county earlier in the day. At 4 p.m, the Lady Indians put on their best game faces to fight for a chance to advance further, and while it was close, Towns County deservingly earned the 5-2 win that kept them in the playoffs.

The following day at 1 p.m, a game vs. Schley County ended up being the girls' last after they suffered a loss of
