# Election

Superior Fulton County Judge Thomas A. Cox Jr. wants to decide the outcome of the Senate before the first vote is cast. In Warnock for Georgia vs State of Georgia, he ruled that counties can do Advance In Person (AIP) Saturday, Nov. 26. Why, "The court finds that the absence of the Saturday vote will irreparably harm the Plaintiffs," i.e. Warnock can't win if he is not able to bus in voters for Saturday AIP.

On appeal, the decision was upheld by the appellant court. and the SOS will not appeal. The result of this decision is, of 159 counties, 18 have enough full time staff to conduct early voting. The 18 are in metro areas that are predominantly Democrat. How this is fair to the voters across the state was not addressed by the court.

What now? Well, early voting goes through Friday, Dec. 2, and Election Day is Dec. 6. This is an unfair election because, with only 18 Democrat counties voting Saturday, how do we fight back? Only a large turnout for Herschel Walker will show Judge Cox and Warnock that they cannot steal an election by changing the rules in the middle of the game.

One last note, in the court document related to this case there is no mention of voters. It appears from the document that voters are of no importance in determining the outcome of this

## Milestone in Human Development

On November 15th the world achieved what the United Nations called a "milestone in human development." The 8 billionth baby was born, no one truly knows where for certain, but symbolically, in worldoutsidethebox.com the Dominican Republic. This achievement has been attributed to improvements in medicine nutrition and hygiene.

I was thinking about that milestone in heavy traffic on the Friday before our holiday week of Thanksgiving began, a palpable press of panic apparent in the dodge and dart of motorists intent on compressing the time and distance between the tail lights in front of them and the perceived obligations of the holiday. I thought about it at home, the sound of bulldozers in the distance as another development digs into one of our mountains.

That milestone was in the back of my mind on Thanksgiving Day as a friend described the frustrated idle of the hourlong stop and go just to get from one side of Knoxville to the other. I thought of it again on the way to town, dodging a discarded bag of fast food tossed out of a window onto the highway, contempt or carelessness, the result being the same.

On the day of thanks, when gratitude helps realign our priorities and put a lot of petty annoyances into perspective, I was doubly grateful to live where, and how, we do. With all the fears and frustrations we are given to consume, the rising prices, the increasingly frequent scarcities in the breakdown of international commerce and supply chains, consider this: As beleaguered as we think we are, if the rest of the world were to suddenly be granted the lifestyle that Americans often take for granted, it would take 5.8 planet Earths to supply the necessary

If we were all to suddenly enjoy the material abundance of people living in India, 8/10ths of our planet would suffice.

Milestone indeed. Yet certain alarmists are fearful at the decreasing, yes, rapidly decreasing birthrate worldwide. The dominant economic paradigm depends on permanent growth, and a stable or declining population does not bode well for share prices and CEO bonuses and the retirement accounts now dependent on such ephemeral things.

It will be left to future generations to validate or disprove the "growth for the sake of growth" theory. Such theories tend to underestimate human ingenuity and invention born of necessity. They also forget that Nature always bats last.

As for the 8 billion of us already here and with the potential to live long enough to be joined by another billion or so even with the decreasing birthrate, a few things seem certain. #### Lime

Lime is a very important part of having healthy soil where we live. Knowing how much to apply and where to apply are very



important considerations to effectively use lime. Let's talk about what lime does, why you need it, how much to apply, and how to apply it.

There are a couple of different types of lime that you can purchase. Ag lime is a very common type. It is made up of calcium, carbon, and oxygen. Ag lime will do a very good job of raising the pH in your soil. Dolomitic lime also raises the pH level of soil, but it has magnesium in it as well. If your soil is deficient in magnesium, dolomitic lime is a good option to raise the soil pH, and to increase the amount of magnesium in

your soil. Both of these types of lime take 6-9 months to be fully active in the soil.

When you get to the bottom of it lime raises the pH in soil. If you recall from chemistry class, pH is basically a measure of the free hydrogen ions in a substance. In this case that substance is soil. pH is a scale that goes from 1 - 14. Numbers below 7 are acidic and numbers above 7 are basic. 7 is neutral. Our soil is going to be naturally acidic. I've seen soil reports with pH ranging from 4.5 - 5.5. Most plants like to have a pH of 6 - 6.5. pH is very important because it impacts how available the nutrients are to plants to be able to take them up. If the pH is low, then most plants won't be able to grow because they can't utilize the nutrients that are in the soil.

There's no way to accurately know how much lime you need to add with doing a soil test first. A soil test will make a recommendation for how much lime you should add based on your pH. It is possible to add too much lime. If you add lime year after year with looking at a soil test as a guide you may end up over liming your land. This can lead to a pH that is too high. You can run into similar issues as with a pH that is too low. A high pH is not common around here unless you've over applied lime. In the western half of the country soils naturally have a high pH.


In small areas lime can be applied with a push spreader. You want the lime to make as much contact with the soil as possible, so it may take a few days to water it in. Lime does not dissolve very well in water so it may take a while for the lime to take full effect. Lime can be bought in powder form or pelletized. Both works well, but the pelletized may make less of a mess. Liquid lime or fast acting lime start to work in the soil more quickly, but their effect does not last as long, meaning that you will need to reapply lime every year. Ag lime and dolomitic lime should last about three years. Because they take months to become effective applying lime at this time of year is a good idea. Ashes can also be used to raise soil pH, but be careful as they may raise the pH higher than desired.
