Towns County suffered a pair of home loss on Friday night to Union County, but bounced back 24 hours later with two region wins at Lincoln

The Lady Indians team had its share of ups and downs last weekend as they officially moved into the Region 8-A season. On Friday night, Dec. 8, they lost a non-region home game against Union County. The following day, they traveled to Lincoln County to battle their first region opponent and came out on top by a score of 64-26.

After a tough loss at Union County on Nov. 28, the team was eager for Friday night's rematch; however, they couldn't build up much momentum on the court.

Despite notable scoring contributions from Brelan Sieveking, Kaleigh Beaver, Scotlyn Fain and Laura Mauldin, the team still couldn't pick up the pace, resulting in a loss

"We never really got going and (we) played from behind the entire game," commented coach Shea Taylor. "Our defense was not rotating well and we were careless with the ball on offense.'

Sieveking finished with 14 points, Beaver had 11 and Fain added 8 points. Mauldin scored 2 points and Ansleigh Hardin chipped in a free throw.

After the loss, Taylor knew that the team needed to make a big response the following night – and luckily, they did not disappoint him.

"(Saturday) night at Lincoln County, we played much

Towns County withstood heavy pressure from Lincoln County throughout the second half, but still managed to grow the lead to 48-37 by the end of the third quarter.

The fourth quarter saw little scoring action from either team, but thanks to a huge steal by Kade McConnell, Towns County secured a 55-44 victory.

Other prominent players included Floyd, who led the team in scoring with 17 points, 12 rebounds and 8 assists; Chastain, who pitched in 10 points and 5 rebounds; Walker Underwood had 9 points on three 3-pointers and Gage Rogers who did a phenomenal job holding Lincoln County's first-team all region point guard under control.

"This was such a huge game for us. I'm so proud of the boys and the toughness that they showed to bounce back from Friday night and travel three hours to play a tough road game in a hostile environment and come out with a victory," said Hunnicut.
