In regards to those amongst us who sacrificed much in Vietnam here's a historical tribute to those who sacrificed their Christmases away from home and families in Vietnam. Bear in mind many of those were NOT volunteers, but when ordered to report for duty, report they did!

Operation Linebacker II. North Vietnam,1972. This air campaign as part of the biggest bombing mission in military history occurred during Christmas season 1972. President Richard Nixon immediately ordered these bombings to begin, December 18, after the Communist North Vietnamese attendees walked out of the "peace talks" and this is considered as THE action that ended U.S. involvement in that often mismanaged, awful war meant to set free the South Vietnamese people. This campaign was sometimes called the "11 Days of Christmas". Our forces consisted of B-52 Stratofortress bombers from Anderson AFB in Guam lasting 11 successive days, with the exception of Christmas Day. Our troops were given a 36 hour break. President Nixon ordered the Communists back to the bargaining table, after which they refused, thus triggering the intense bombings until 29 December. In 11 days, Linebacker II dropped 15,000 tons of bombs via 729 U.S. Air Force sorties involving about 12,000 airmen. Defense Department records show the raids destroyed or damaged 1,600 structures, 500 rail targets, 10 airfields and 80 percent of North Vietnam's electric-generating capacity. This action to cease hostile actions cost us fifteen B-52s, 35 fine men, and another 40 American POW s. Although our participation in that war would not end until two years afterwards, Linebacker II led directly to the Paris Peace Accords in January 1973.

So with this tiny reflection upon that which so many of our men and women have and continue to sacrifice their Christmases for please remember them, honor them, love them as they love each other and America. May God Bless all the men, women and their families who have served America this Christmas season, past, present and forevermore. Jesus was sent to us, just as we celebrate on Christmas. He Knew His future sacrifice to become our Risen Christ which also represents a true "soldier for all others" as he was later hung from the Cross, not unlike those men and women who also gave their all for others. Each of us can serve with our hearts, minds and souls, seeking to do better for America and each other. Have a very Merry Christmas! May God Bless America!

Dear Editor,



images of merriment we see advertised and we find our own lives wanting. Some are filled with the spirit of fellowship and generosity and wonder why that spirit struggles to endure into the new year.

At our house this year, no one is waiting with growing anticipation to uncover the mysteries under the Christmas tree. The sound of children laughing, the smell of baking cookies the voices of carolers, the joining of hands around the table, all are memories that grow dearer, and farther away, each year.

Whatever is left to us through choice and circumstance of the things most dear, time will eventually take from us anyhow. This year the seats around our family table are almost all empty. Yet today I am filled with gratitude, grateful to be alive, grateful for good health, for peace and comfort, for friends and family which remain, and countless other blessings. Which brings us to the question, "Why Christmas?" Why, indeed, Christianity?

Nothing I could say on the matter was not better said eighty years ago by C.S. Lewis, but he was not asked this very personal question quite recently, having said all he's going to say on the matter. A personal question deserves a personal reply, especially when failing to do so defeats the purpose of having any faith at all, or perhaps negates it entirely.

I celebrate Christmas in commemoration of the birth of Christ, and to borrow for just a moment from Lewis, "I believe in Christianity as I believe that the sun has risen. Not only be cause I see it, but because by it I see everything else.'


"But why? It's not logical. It's not historically accurate. It's not scientific.

Christ reminded us that we are part of something greater than ourselves. We live on a world we did not create, and as we move through it in ignorance or in spite, we cause harm, and a debt is owed for that damage. This is a debt which, through our own actions we cannot pay, but it was paid for us. The principle of sacrifice as a parent sacrifices for a child, or one mate for another, is imminently logical, and as old as life on earth.

Historically the Scriptures have stubbornly resisted debunking for centuries as archaeology continues to verify names and places as well as events. And scientifically? For me it was science which pointed the way back to faith. I studied quantum physics for a time in college while probing for a direction my major might take. Quantum physics is the study of possibility, where thought and attention become essential components of reality itself, where thought is a thing as real as any number of fundamental particles which only seem to exist when you're looking at them. It was actually Christian faith that saved my life. Once I became ill and there were no answers to be found in any of the religions that instruct us how to become worthy of the hereafter. The only "god" that listened was the One spoken to by a church that believes salvation is a gift, and while their faith supported my own tiny spark, my body healed. Science said that I would be left with a number of scars and disabilities, but through faith, the illness simply left, and by the grace of God I am today as strong as a mule, though not quite as pretty. In the continuing practice of that faith, I discovered that Christianity simply works. When you converse with the Creator, things just have a way of working out. Synchronicities start appearing in your life, and apparent coincidences that seem to defy logic. It has little to do with belief. Belief engages facts and logic and is subject to the laws of creation. Faith, on the other hand, is about trust, and the science of possibility. Asked and answered, with a few travel notes from one man's journey. Everyone must make their own. I'll leave you this week with another gem from C. S. Lewis: "Miracles are a retelling in small letters of the very same story which is written across the whole world in letters too large for some of us to see."

Holly

Holly trees are often used in Christmas decorations or as landscaping plants. This time of year, they provide some beautiful



color with their green leaves and red berries. We actually have several different species of holly that are native to our area. Let's talk about the different types of holly in our area and how to take care of them.

Hollies are members of the genus Ilex. This genus has over 570 members from all over the world. Some species in the Ilex genus are evergreen, and some are deciduous. Two of the more common species of holly that we see here are American holly and Yaupon holly. Both of these

species are evergreen. Typically, the holly that you see on postcards around Christmas time is the English holly. As inferred by its name, it is not native to this area. American holly has the prickly leaves that we associate with Christmas holly, while yaupon holly leaves are not prickly.

The American holly and Yaupon holly are dioecious trees. meaning that they have separate male and female plants. The red berries only grow on female plants, but they must have a male tree nearby to pollinate them. The flowers are very small and white. It is not advised to eat the berries as they are mildly toxic to humans and animals. Yaupon leaves can be used to make a caffeinated tea. The time of year that the leaves are harvested changes the flavor of the tea. They tend to do well in our area as they can grow in full sun to part shade, and like a soil that is acidic. You can purchase fertilizers made specifically for hollies. The main difference between a fertilizer for hollies and other fertilizers is that the holly fertilizer will turn the soil slightly acidic over time. You can use holly fertilizer on other acid loving plants like blueberries, rhododendrons, and azaleas.

There are many varieties of American and Yaupon holly that you can purchase and plant in your yard. Some varieties of American holly are able to self-pollinate and produce berries without a male present. There are also some varieties that have yellow berries instead of the typical red.

There are not too many insect pests that affect hollies. Leaf miners, spider mites, scale can have an impact, but usually horticultural oil will treat them. If they are planted in soils that remain wet for too long hollies can have issues with root rot. If root rot takes hold the tree will need to be removed. Sapsuckers are birds that will drill holes in trees to consume the sap. They do seem to like hollies. If you see lots of holes in the bark along a horizontal line that is likely sapsucker damage.

Evergreen hollies will drop leaves in the spring and the fall. They shouldn't drop more than a third of the leaves. If they drop too many leaves, that is a sign that the tree could be under stress from disease, insects, or soil pH that is too high.

Due to HB 153, on June 30th of 2023, Mountain Ed will lose chartered school status. This will force it to be authorized by a local system, none of which have offered to partner to do so. This school system will be dissolved even though it has significantly changed the lives of its graduates and lowered the dropout rate in 18 counties, including yours.

Mountain Education serves students who have returned to school to give themselves a fighting chance in life. Many of these students do not have parents who will advocate for them.
