

As the game progressed into the fourth quarter, Tallulah Falls showed off their resilience and determination with a remarkable comeback, gradually chipping away at the deficit until they had seized the lead in the game's final minutes.





All of the proceeds from the ticket booth will go straight back into the basketball and other sports programs, with a portion going towards the Battle of the States Scholarship. This scholarship supports seniors who plan to further their education after high school.

Towns will tip off their involvement in the tournament as they face Hayesville, NC in an opening round matchup.
